ALLISON INQUIRY UPDATE – LISTENING TO CANADIAN COVID-19 VACCINE INJURED

On September 8, 9, 10 and 11, 2026, the Allison Inquiry will listen to the testimony of Canadians injured by a Covid-19 vaccine. Canadians from across the country will give their testimony live from Parliament Hill in Ottawa.

The inquiry will be chaired by Member of Parliament Dean Allison. The inquiry is non-partisan and gives all Members of Parliament a formal setting to listen to Canadians who need their voices heard by Parliament.

Members of Parliament who have themselves been injured by the Covid-19 vaccines are also encouraged to apply to be witnesses.

Canadians are lining up to tell their stories

The Allison Inquiry has been overwhelmed with applications by Canadians requesting to tell their stories to MPs. There have been over 1,000 formal applications.

The applications are raising troubling questions concerning the treatment of the vaccine injured by the medical system.

These applications are also revealing challenges that injured Canadians have faced seeking compensation for their injuries from the Vaccine Injury Support Program. The injured were promised that no one would be left behind. Hopeful that they would be compensated for their injuries, Canadians have instead found themselves stonewalled and rejected by the program.

The announcement of the Allison Inquiry has ignited a discussion about Covid-19 vaccine injury within Canada. There is now international attention on the discussions that will happen on Parliament Hill in Ottawa. It has been a welcome first step.

On Thursday, August 13, at 10 a.m. ET, the Allison Inquiry is holding a press conference in Parliament's Press Gallery. Updates on the progress and challenges facing the inquiry will be shared.

More than 30 democratic countries, including many G7 and Commonwealth nations, have launched major Covid-19 inquiries examining lockdowns, mandates, vaccines, and government decision-making.

Canada has yet to undertake any Parliamentary inquiry concerning Covid-19.

The Allison Inquiry is a preliminary inquiry to create a neutral forum for Canadians to share their personal experiences of injuries to themselves or to others from the Covid-19 vaccine(s).

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
